Challenges of Transferring Planning Knowledge and Experience to Other Planning Cultures

Can planning approaches to urban and regional development from the Western world, from the US, from Britain, Italy or France or Germany be "exported" to other planning cultures? Much has been written about the challenge. The opinions of the community of planners are divided. Planners, mainly those in the anglophone world dream of a global planning culture, where planning follows universal aims and rules, while most planners in mainland Europe are convinced that the local and regional context matters. that language as well as the knowledge of the legal, economic and politico-administrative conditions in a country are crucial, when planning for urban and regional development, when planning for people in cities and rural places. Only when being rooted in local and regional planning cultures, and knowing about land ownership, sustainable and just urban and rural development for people can be achieved. In China there is much interest among planners to learn from planning in other countries, though given different political systems and cultural traditions, such transfer is always a tightrope act that requires much sensitivity and willingness to immerse into the cultural context of another country independent from academic zeitgeist paradigms in the Western hemisphere.

Background

Upon initiative of professor Yi Xin, director of the Sino-German Urban, Rural & Architecture Research Center at SEU, who received his PhD from the Technical University of Munich where the jubilarian graduated in 1967, the 2022 conference will bring together European and Chinese planners using new technology enabling virtual meetings. It will recall a conference, which took place at Dortmund University in 2006, when the jubilarian retired after 32 years of research and lecturing at the Dortmund School of Planning. The contributions to this conference, titled 'Europe and China' were published by Routledge in 2010 as China and Europe: The Implications of the Rise of China for European Space.
